SEL Strategy #1

Engage Students in Building a Caring Classroom Community

- In this time of climate crisis, our students need relationships they can count on and a community that has their back.
- An array of SEL activities is available to strengthen relationships in your classroom and build group solidarity.







Strategy #1 Activities

- Group games: Fun ways for students to get to know each other
- Community agreements: Students envision the classroom they hope for and take responsibility for creating it
- Have a heart: Making the classroom a putdown-free zone







SEL Strategy #2

Teach Students Skills in Active Listening, Understanding & Managing Feelings


- Active listening is the foundation for building the trustworthy friendships and a caring community so critical for fostering resilience in this era of climate crisis.
- The changes in the climate will trigger feelings big time.
 We can learn skills in managing our feelings so that they work for us and not against us.





Strategy #2 Activities

- The Three Ps of Active Listening
 - Pay attention
 - Provide gentle encouragement
 - Paraphrase (say in your own words)
 what you've heard the person say
- Expanding Students' Feelings Vocabularies
- Cooling Down Practices





Strategy #3

Provide Brave Spaces for Students to Share Feelings & Concerns


- Students are increasingly experiencing climate disasters and other upsetting events on the news, social media, and first-hand.
- Brave spaces are times set aside when students can share their feelings, be listened to without judgment, and realize they are not alone.





Strategy #3 Activities

- Regular Check-ins: *How is Your Heart Today?*
- Listening Circles
- Guidelines for Responding When a Student Expresses
 Feelings and Concerns about the Climate Crisis







SEL Strategy #4

Facilitate Productive Conversations about Controversial Issues

- To disagree without being disagreeable is an essential part of building a community where all have a place at the table.
- Active listening and anger management skills can be useful when a topic triggers strong feelings.
- Skillful facilitation by the teacher can turn hot topics into teachable moments.

Strategy #5 Practice Self-Care

- Educators carry a heavy emotional burden as they work with young people who fear for their future
- To be of use to them, we need to **take good care of ourselves.**
- There are regular practices we can use to maintain a balanced perspective and stay centered on what's most important.







Strategy #5 Activities



- Practice Active Hope
- Meet Regularly with a Listening Partner
- Pause for Centering and Reconnecting


